Our schools are categorised by dimension, or need-type. The dimensions include:

- **C&I – Communication & Interaction Schools.** These are primarily for children and young people with ASD.
- **PSCN – Profound, Severe & Complex Need Schools.** These are for children and young people with need types ranging from profound to moderate.
- **PD – Physical Disability Schools.** These are for children and young people with physical difficulties and complex needs.
- **SEMH – Social, Emotional & Mental Health Schools.** These are for children and young people with learning disabilities as a result of long-term emotional and social difficulties.

We are made up of 26 Special Schools across all of the districts in Kent. Schools join us as Members or Partners.

Member Schools:

- Are foundation schools which are funded by the Local Authority but run by their own governing body. The Trust legally holds the land and buildings on behalf of the governing body
- Pay £25 per pupil (based on Jan roll figures) annual subscription

Partner Schools:

- Can be different types of school; fundamentally they are affiliated with KsENT but legally belong to another Trust
- Pay £15 per pupil (based on Jan roll figures) annual subscription
- Sign a Partner School Agreement annually

What is KsENT?

KsENT stands for Kent Special Education Needs Trust. It is a Cooperative Foundation Trust of 26 schools across Kent with the aim of improving opportunities for children and young people with SEND. As of July 2024, all of our member schools have been graded either “Good” or “Outstanding” following their most recent Ofsted inspection.

KsENT originally consisted of KASS (Kent Association of Special Schools) and CLASS (Collaborative Learning Alliance of Special Schools). These merged in September 2017 to become the Kent Special Education Needs Trust; a legal entity with a formal commitment to work together to:

- Benefit children and young people with SEND across our schools
- Retain our autonomy as maintained schools in opposition to the Academisation agenda
- Serve as a central driver of SEND provision across Kent

The Co-operative Movement



The Co-operative Movement began in Britain and France in the 19th century to address inequalities caused by the Industrial Revolution which threatened worker's livelihoods. Fast forward to today and the Movement has developed into a formalised Co-operative Model of seven principles that has benefited the lives of millions of people globally.

The seven principles of the Cooperative Model are:

1. A co-op is owned and controlled by its members
2. A co-op is democratic – every member has an equal say in how it's run
3. Every member contributes financially in some way
4. A co-op is an independent organisation, owned and controlled by its members
5. It offers education and training to everyone involved, so they can develop the co-op and promote the benefits of co-operation
6. It co-operates, works with and support other co-ops
7. A co-op supports the communities it works with

Co-operative Foundation Trusts

KsENT is a Co-operative Foundation Trust. There are two aspects to this; the 'foundation' aspect and the 'co-operative' aspect.

A Foundation Trust is defined by the following traits:

- It is made up of foundation (i.e. local authority maintained) schools
- This means that although the school is funded by the local authority, its governing body employs staff and is responsible for setting the school's admissions policy
- The foundation schools are supported by a charitable foundation (Trust) which consists of a number of partners
- The Trust holds the land and buildings for the school on behalf of its governing body

A Co-operative Foundation Trust is a type of Foundation Trust which includes the Schools Co-operative Society as a member as well as its other partners. It also includes a stakeholder forum which involves parents, pupils, staff and other stakeholders so they can be involved in the Trust and have a say in how it is run.

Trust Structure

As a Cooperative Foundation Trust, we operate on a democratic basis so all of our decisions are voted on by our Trustees; there is no one person “in charge”! Our Trustees are made up of the Headteachers and Chairs of Governors of our schools as well as representatives from our Partners. We also have an Executive which steers the direction of the Trust but ultimately answers to the Trust Board. This is made up of 10 members including Headteachers, the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Trust and a representative from the Leadership Forum.

Trust Offer



KsENT Support: Leadership Forum & Networking Groups

The Leadership Forum also work collaboratively to offer Tier 2 training at no cost to Trust members and partners.
