Our schools are categorised by dimension, or need-type. The dimensions include:

- C&I Communication & Interaction Schools. These are primarily for children and young people with ASD.
- PSCN Profound, Severe & Complex Need Schools. These are for children and young people with need types ranging from profound to moderate.
- PD Physical Disability Schools. These are for children and young people with physical difficulties and complex needs.
- SEMH Social, Emotional & Mental Health Schools. These are for children and young people with learning disabilities as a result of long-term emotional and social difficulties

# What is KsENT?

KsENT stands for Kent Special Education Needs Trust. It is a Cooperative Foundation Trust of 26 schools across Kent with the aim of improving opportunities for children and young people with SEND. As of June 2023, all of our schools have been graded either "Good" or "Outstanding" following their most recent Ofsted inspection.

### History of KsENT

KsENT originally consisted of KASS (Kent Association of Special Schools) and CLASS (Collaborative Learning Alliance of Special Schools). These merged in September 2017 to become the Kent Special Education Needs Trust; a legal entity with a formal commitment to work together to:

- Benefit children and young people with SEND across our schools
- Retain our autonomy as maintained schools in opposition to the Academisation agenda
- Serve as a central driver of SEND provision across Kent

# The Co-operative Movement

The Co-operative Movement began in Britain and France in the 19<sup>th</sup> century to address inequalities caused by the Industrial Revolution which threatened worker's livelihoods. Fast forward to today and the Movement has developed into a formalised Co-operative Model of seven principles that has benefited the lives of millions of people globally.

The seven principles of the Cooperative Model are:

- 1. A co-op is owned and controlled by its members
- 2. A co-op is **democratic** every member has an equal say in how it's run
- 3. Every member contributes financially in some way
- 4. A co-op is an **independent** organisation, owned and controlled by its members
- 5. It offers **education and training** to everyone involved, so they can develop the co-op and promote the benefits of co-operation
- 6. It **co-operates**, works with and support other co-ops
- 7. A co-op supports the **communities** it works with

# **Co-operative Foundation Trusts**

KsENT is a Co-operative Foundation Trust. There are two aspects to this; the 'foundation' aspect and the 'cooperative' aspect.

A Foundation Trust is defined by the following traits:

- It is made up of foundation (i.e. local authority maintained) schools
- This means that although the school is funded by the local authority, its governing body employs staff and is responsible for setting the school's admissions policy
- The foundation schools are supported by a charitable foundation (Trust) which consists of a number of partners
- The Trust holds the land and buildings for the school on behalf of its governing body

A Co-operative Foundation Trust is a type of Foundation Trust which includes the Schools Co-operative Society as a member as well as its other partners. It also includes a stakeholder forum which involves parents, pupils, staff and other stakeholders so they can be involved in the Trust and have a say in how it is run.



The Schools Co-operative Society is a national body which represents state-run schools in England that share

a Co-operative ethos. Its Members set up the Co-operative Schools Network (CSNET) to deliver a regional, representative approach to support schools through a national network.

### Member & Partner Schools

We are made up of 26 Special Schools across all of the districts in Kent. Schools join us as Members or Partners.

Member Schools:

- Are foundation schools which are funded by the Local Authority but run by their own governing body. The Trust legally holds the land and buildings on behalf of the governing body
- Pay £25 per pupil (based on Jan roll figures) annual subscription

Partner Schools:

- Can be different types of school; fundamentally they are affiliated with KsENT but legally belong to another Trust
- Pay £15 per pupil (based on Jan roll figures) annual subscription
- Sign a Partner School Agreement annually

KsENT Offer:

- A strong voice we are the largest group of Special Schools in Kent which gives us a strong platform to work collaboratively with the local authority and other key partners to deliver the best provision for our children and young people with SEND in Kent
- Support network & sharing best practice we have a range of Forums and groups which provide support and CPD opportunities for our stakeholders
- School Improvement assistance we offer bespoke Peer to Peer and Safeguarding Reviews for all KsENT schools who opt in
- Pooling resources we offer opportunities for schools who opt in to pool resources and enjoy discounts on services which can benefit their provision

### Our Partners

Along with the Co-op Schools Network, we are also partnered with Canterbury Christ Church University and the Thames Gateway Teaching School Hub as our teacher training providers.

Canterbury Christ Church University:

We have been partnered with CCCU since 2016 as our Schools Direct accredited provider for our Initial Teacher Training programme. So far we have trained over 90 teachers in our schools through both salaried and unsalaried routes with a 93%



completion rate compared to the national average of 85%.

Thames Gateway Teaching School Hub:



Thames Gateway have partnered with us to provide our Early Careers Framework for trainees in the first two years

after they have qualified as a teacher. This gives them the essential specialist support they need to improve their practice and build confidence following their teacher training.



### Structure

As a Cooperative Foundation Trust, we operate on a democratic basis so all of our decisions are voted on by our Trustees; there is no one person "in charge"! Our Trustees are made up of the Headteachers and Chairs of Governors of our schools as well as representatives from our Partners. We also have an Executive which steers the direction of the Trust but ultimately answers to the Trust Board. This is made up of 10 members including Headteachers, the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Trust and a representative from the Leadership Forum.

- Cooperative Values: To embody cooperative values and principles throughout the operations and activities of the Trust. Lead - Alan Norley
- Risk Management: To establish an adaptable culture which manages seen and unforeseen threats and opportunities. Lead - Annabel Lilley
- Engagement: To participate in a collaborative ethos to improve opportunities for all children and young people with SEND in Kent. Lead - Roberta Kane

We will use these priorities to direct our activity to benefit our 3 main stakeholder groups of Pupils, Schools and Communities. Each of our Forums listed on the previous page has a Development Plan detailing the specific targets and actions they will be taking to work towards these priorities.
